Communication with the College

I would like to remind parents about using the central tc@collingwood.surrey.sch.uk email address rather than sending emails directly to staff. Using 'tc@collingwood' ensures emails will be responded to within three working days, even if the member of staff is absent, as this inbox is monitored by a senior member of staff.

I would also like to remind parents of the home-school agreement which requests that parents always raise issues with the College directly and that parents do not resort to using social media platforms. Experience suggests that using social media never helps in dealing with issues and invariably makes the situation more difficult to resolve.

Could I also ask that parents ensure that in their communications with College staff, they exhibit the same levels of politeness and respect that they would expect to be treated themselves. We will not tolerate aggressive language or behaviour towards our staff, and phone calls or meetings will be terminated if necessary.

Although the vast majority of communications from parents are supportive and constructive, I wanted to remind all parents of our expectations. Thank you in anticipation of your co-operation on this.

CHILDREN AND FAMILY HEALTH LAUNCH NEW WEBPAGE

Children and Family Health Surrey has launched a new webpage to provide winter safety advice to families including tips about road crossing and being seen in the dark, cycling, playing in the snow and keeping warm.

The advice includes:

- ◆ Remind older children to put away their phones and take out any earphones when crossing roads.
- ◆ Get your child into the habit of wearing their helmet and if you cycle as a family, remember to wear yours too. It is a legal requirement to have lights and reflectors on bikes when you are out between sunset and sunrise.
- ◆ When sledging in the snow choose a slope that is not too steep, make sure it is free of obstacles and does not end near a road, body of water or solid objects such as trees, fences and walls.
- ◆ Babies lose heat through their heads so remove hats or hoods when indoors, in a shopping centre or in a car, and remove all outdoor clothing when indoors to avoid overheating.

FROM THE PRINCIPAL ...

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Measles Outbreaks

In last week's email update to education settings from the DfE, the department included the following information about measles outbreaks:

"There have been recent localised outbreaks of measles centred around the West Midlands. There is a risk of further outbreaks in other areas unless urgent action is taken to increase Measles, Mumps and Rubella (MMR) vaccination take up in areas with low MMR vaccine rates.

"Measles spreads very easily among those who are unvaccinated, especially in nurseries and schools. The best protection against measles for children and adults is to get both doses of the MMR vaccine. It is never too late to have these vaccinations.


WARM WELCOME VENUES RETURN TO SURREY

ATTENDANCE - LEAVE OF ABSENCE/ HOLIDAY REQUESTS

Just to remind parents/carers that if they take their children out of school without authority, they will be liable to receive a penalty notice. Currently the amount payable under a penalty notice is £60.00 per parent/carer per child if paid within 21 days. Thereafter the amount increases to £120.00 if paid between 21 and 28 days. If the penalty notice remains unpaid after 28 days, the Local Authority will consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court. Please note that penalty notices are issued per parent/carer per child so a family of two parents and two children will receive 4 penalty notices.

YEAR 9 FINAL SCHOOL BOOSTER VACCINE / MENINGOCOCCAL ACWY VACCINE – TUESDAY 20 FEBRUARY AND WEDNESDAY 21 FEBRUARY

REMINDER

If you have **not yet** completed your e-consent for your child to receive the above vaccines, please can you ensure this is done by 4.00pm on **Wednesday 14 February 2024**.

You will have received an **acknowledgement email from the Surrey Immunisation Team, if you have already provided your consent.**

Diphtheria/Tetanus/Polio 3-in-1 final school booster protects against diphtheria, tetanus and polio. This vaccination will complete the baby injections given pre-school.

Meningococcal ACWY protects against the four strains of meningitis known as ACWY. These diseases are known to affect older adolescents, especially if they go to university or training where they are living in accommodation with other young people.
